What volunteering for CLRSS can look like

There are so many varied ways that you can raise your hands in support of environmental stewardship. Become a member of stewardship groups in your community, donate money, show up to support activities, talk up the need and the work of your local group...

Right now, CLRSS is seeking one or two individuals who have access to a boat on Cowichan Lake to collect water samples this fall.

- Do you care about the health of Cowichan Lake, its tributaries, and the Cowichan River?
- Do you use and enjoy the benefits of a healthy, sustainable fishery in the lake and river?
- Do you have access to a boat and are willing to donate an hour of your time once a week for 5 weeks this fall?

If so, your assistance is needed to collect water samples once per week, commencing around mid-October, from six sites located on Cowichan Lake *which are only accessible by boat.* Samples need to be collected in the morning, for five consecutive weeks (typically on Tuesdays). Training is provided and an honorarium to help defer the cost of boat gas may be provided (pending availability of sufficient grant funds).

This is the second part of the water quality monitoring program, initiated by the Cowichan Watershed Board, in partnership with industry, government, non-government stewardship organizations and First Nations, in response to the massive fish kill last year on the Cowichan River. Data collected under this program is helping fisheries managers understand the impact of last year's fish kill and is supporting positive change to avoid another such loss.

Yikes - There's More!

Once again CLRSS is helping the BC Conservation Foundation to sample local waters for *toxic 6-PPDQ*, a tire preservative used since the 60s to prevent cracking and degradation of rubber. The compound is deposited on roadways and enters streams and waterways during heavy rainfall events. The problem is that it has been linked to 'urban run off mortality syndrome' in coho salmon. Multiple trout and salmon species can be impacted but both returning adult and juvenile (age 1+ yrs) are particularly vulnerable at extremely low levels! Concentrations as low as 40-100 ng/L (nanograms per litre) are lethal in fish and even if relocated to toxin-free waters, impacted fish will not recover.

What is the 'ask' for this upcoming season? The study will be continued this year, testing streams from last year that had concentrations of 6-PDDQ and include any new streams not previously sampled but that have historically contained salmon spawning runs and that are traversed by busy roadways.

That means during major rain events from September through January, Stanley, Hatchery and Exeter Creeks plus others suggested by the team, will be tested for 6-PPDQ.

CLRSS currently has four team members, but we need three or four more, so we can form three crews, including alternates for scheduling flexibility. The BCCF staffer will identify upcoming rain events and Cam McCauley and Hugh Sutherland of CLRSS will coordinate the crew, taking turns sampling before, during and after the rain events.


Quw'utsun Sta'lo' Skweyul Cowichan River Day




